## Dear Parent/Carer,

Our sports stars have been busy this week taking part in local competitions, with commitment and enthusiasm displayed in abundance. The Plymouth Swimming Gala saw over 20 swimmers competing in a Hele's team for the first time ever on Monday evening - I'm told that it was a great team effort, and everyone had a brilliant time! The U14 Cross Country Meet last night saw a trio of Year 8 boys compete, with Jamie Farmer securing 3<sup>rd</sup> place, Knox Townsend coming 5<sup>th</sup> and Marley Garland finishing just outside of the top 20. Out of school, Grace Nicholls (9F) and Talia Penrose (7A) have had fantastic success in the Street House Southwest Regional Championships with their dance school, with Talia even qualifying for the 3-day British championships in November. Well done to all our superstars!

**Invacuation procedure:** We are all familiar with the evacuation drill and we practise this each term as a whole school to ensure our procedures remain sharp and effective. This allows us to remain confident that we can get everyone out of the building to safety in the event of a fire, for instance.

Of course, there may be occasions where we need to quickly restrict access to a site or a building in response to a threat, either external or internal, and to keep people inside the classroom/building rather than evacuate. Whilst we have a procedure in place for 'invacuation', it has not been routinely practised until now. Like many public organisations, we feel it is prudent to plan for every eventuality and introduce regular practices to our safeguarding procedures. We have been talking to students in Assembly recently about what to do in the unlikely event of an emergency at school requiring an invacuation procedure. As you can imagine, this caused excitement amongst many and anxiety amongst some, especially in the lower year groups. The intention isn't to worry or frighten anyone, but rather to ensure we are well-placed to respond quickly and safely to any eventuality we may be faced with. It is important to stress that the likelihood of ever needing to invacuate is minimal, but nonetheless it is important that we prepare, plan and practise. Please be assured that later this term we will have a controlled walk-through of this drill, so that we all become familiar with this routine. Should you have any questions about our invacuating procedure, please do not hesitate to contact school.

**NEU strike action, days 3 and 4:** detailed information has already been emailed to all families, but in summary:

- Wednesday 15 March Year 9 plus Years 11, 12 and 13 in school and Years 7, 8 and 10 remote learning at home.
- Thursday 16 March Year 10 plus Years 11, 12 and 13 in school and Years 7, 8 and 9 remote learning at home.

We have manged to maintain an in-school provision despite significant pressures faced through staffing challenges and ensured that all year groups will have had at least 1 in-school day across the 4 days of action. However, we do appreciate that industrial action is disruptive, and recognise you may need to change your plans or working arrangements whilst this action is ongoing, often with financial impact or causing significant inconvenience to you and your family. We thank you for your patience and understanding at this time.
